While Nonnie knows that her lungs will not improve, the portable oxygen tank has given her a new freedom of mobility.



Nonnie can now participate in various activities like cooking classes with the rest of her friends. She was also able to attend field trips and she even participated in a local radio show. Today Nonnie can do a lot of the activities any teenager can do.
